Deeply embedded structural drivers, webs of non-linear causality, and the social, organisational and political processes of change, all influence the dynamic behaviour of our complex of health and social systems. Systems thinking and modelling is a broad methodology that offers conceptual and practical tools that can help organise dynamic complexity in a transparent way and support shared understanding of the consequences of policy choices and actions. With growing recognition of the interconnected, relational nature of emergent public health challenges, there is a proliferation in the use of systems thinking and modelling. They provide an opportunity to design more effective public health strategies that better account for feedback relationships, long-term uncertainty and unintended consequences.</p> <p>In this workshop we bring together expertise on systems thinking and modelling in public health so that you can:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• learn more about what systems thinking and modelling means in practical terms• hear about current examples that illustrate the breadth of systems thinking and modelling methods in public health• have an opportunity to do some hands on systems thinking using housing as a case study• draw your own insights into how you think these methods could contribute to public health policy• leave with useful resources for your public health practice
